Primary Authority Advice

Relevant Legislation:	The Fish Labelling Regulations 2013		
Geographic Applicability:	This has the status of Primary Authority Advice in England.		
Scope:	This advice is addressed to businesses in the regulated group which are food business operators engaged in labelling of prepacked frozen food.		
Details of request:	Can you please define, what is the minimum size of cooked prawn that can legally be declared "King Prawn"? Historically we've used the Commercial designations of fish: United Kingdom - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk), which states: Commercial Species		
	designation King prawn	All species of the family Aristaeidae All species of the family Palaemonidae All species of the family Penaeidae Where the count is less than 123 per kg (head on/shell on) or less than 198 per kg (head off/shell on) or less than 242 per kg (head off/shell off)	
	However, this does not reference whether this applies to "cooked prawns" as packed, or as to the raw ingoing prawns prior to cooking?		
	For example: Cooking Raw Peeled King Prawns (i.e., <242 per kg) could produce cooked Prawns which fall outside of the "King Prawn" range. However, could we then legally call these cooked prawns "King Prawns" as the ingoing raw material is, by definition, "King Prawn".

	The Commercial Designations list does not refer to cooked product except in particular entries. In the case of King Prawn, no reference is made to 'cooked' and therefore relates to the prawns in their raw state.			
Advice provided:	Consequently, when they are cooked there will be some natural moisture (and therefore weight) loss which may render the count per kilogram to be more than specified. There is therefore no minimum cooked weight, rather a minimum pre-cooked weight.			
	It would be correct to state such product as 'cooked king prawns' with the processor's records demonstrating that the raw prawns complied with the commercial designation applied.			
	NOTE the full list should be consulted for other commercial designations using 'shrimp' and 'prawn'

Communication with businesses	This advice will be published in electronic format and located in the Technical Guidance area of the BFFF website: http://bfff.co.uk/technical/guidance/ .			
Communication with enforcing authorities:	An enforcing authority, proposing to take enforcement action against a business, is only required to notify the primary authority, where they are aware that the business is a member of a regulated group. While guidance states that the enforcing authority should ask you whether you are relying on Primary Authority advice, we recommend that you ensure you communicate this as soon as possible, and do not wait to be asked. (para 21.5 of the Statutory Guidance refers). The scheme does not allow for a business to make a			



	notification to the primary authority where an enforcing authority has already taken action in respect of which it [the enforcing authority] failed to make the required notification to the primary authority (para 21.20 of the Statutory Guidance refers).
	Additionally, the rules allow for you (or the Co-ordinator) to notify the primary authority (para 21.19 of the Statutory Guidance refers).
	Once a primary authority receives notification, statutory time limits apply (usually 5 days) in which time they must respond to the notification. (Paras 21.9 & 21.10 of the Statutory Guidance refer).
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
